# **Clearing the New Land**

Many of you will be aware that we recently leased some land adjacent to the Activity Centre and the Horse Field from our friends and neighbours at the Burhill Estate. The land was extremely overgrown and had not been used for any purpose for a very long time, and so had to be cleared of some very dense vegetation indeed.

Undeterred, the staff and volunteers undertook to initially clear sufficient area to enable a fence to be installed. It took a gargantuan effort to fight a pathway through the foliage, and then additional effort to get the fence line in the right place. Efforts were supplemented by the arrival of a donated JCB for a fortnight, and additional volunteer chainsaw support. The results thus far are absolutely fantastic - but we still have more work to do to complete the task.

The additional land will be used for activity space, with stage one being the re-location of the Archery Range from its' current position near the Pembroke Hut.

Subsequently there are provisional plans for a Go-Kart track, a bike track and maybe even Tomahawk throwing as an activity!

We have generously been donated the use of a chipper to help clear the debris between 8<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup> June. If you could spare a few hours to come and assist over this week please get in touch.

# AGM, Re-dedication of the Chapel and Low Ropes Opening

On the afternoon of 20<sup>th</sup> May 2017 the Annual General Meeting of the Walton Firs Foundation took place attended by Patrons, Directors and others with an interest in the Charity. Immediately following the Meeting a wide variety of other guests arrived, and the new Mayor of Elmbridge, Councillor Rachael Lake, arrived to preside over the proceedings.

Those present were given a short update on developments at Walton Firs by the Centre Manager, and briefed on some forthcoming projects. The assembly then moved to the Chapel where Reverend Gregory Hargrove conducted a short ceremony recounting the tale of brothers Albert and Albrecht Durer, dedicated the praying hands and re-dedicated the Chapel as a place of reflection for young people.

The guests then proceeded to the new Low Ropes Course, designed by one of the instructors and constructed over the winter months. As mentioned in our previous issue Harken UK generously donated the majority of the rope required, and many of our Patrons assisted with the splicing. The Mayor made a wonderful speech recounting her days as a GSL, and subsequently (and very courageously) safety tested some parts of the course for us before the first group of children were allowed on.

The remaining guests returned to the marquee for refreshments, and those that wished to were given a short tour of the partially cleared newly leased land.

The day was a great success in highlighting the good work of The Walton Firs Foundation, and our heartfelt thanks go out to all the guests, staff and volunteers that contributed to making the day a success.

# High Ropes Course – Cost £75,000

Identified by visitors as the activity they would most like to see on-site.

Telecoms Building – Cost £25,000

Desperately needed for improving volunteer and staff accommodation.

## New Land – Cost £10,000

Clearing and fencing the new land for additional activities comes at a significant cost.

# Ablutions – Cost £40,000 (of £330,000)

The new ablutions were so desperately needed that the Foundation was loaned a sum to enable the work to be completed during the winter.

# Smaller Accommodation – Cost £11,000 (each)

Feedback suggests that hutted accommodation smaller than our current facilities would be very popular. A range of possibilities exist – but a small wooden structure that sleeps up to 7 are our current favourite. We could easily add to the number of huts if they prove popular!
